District 55 Archives

What does “archives” really mean? Why is the idea important? What does an Archivist for District 55 do? These are all good questions that I will try to answer in this short article.

An archive is an accumulation of historical records, that may contain primary source documents that have accumulated over the course of an organization’s lifetime, that are kept to show the organization’s function and to preserve its history. In District 55, the archive consists of more than two very large closed tubs of books, articles such as a photocopy of the famous article in life magazine that introduced Alcoholics Anonymous to the world for the first time, memorabilia, and pictures of un-named old timers. There is a first edition big book, copy of the original manuscript for the same, and many black and white pictures of the Founders. Many pictures of district events are found in archival picture albums.

At an Area Archives quarterly, the Area 72 Archivist talked about obtaining group histories for our district. There are many groups that have been operating for thirty years or more, and we have no formal histories of them. If any group is interested in researching and documenting their group history, I have forms and guidelines to help. It would be helpful to future groups to have a compilation of how groups formed in the past, and how they stayed viable so long. Our history is important.

Another project that has been on my heart for some time is compiling a “Memory Book” of our compatriots that have passed on, leaving a rich legacy to those that remember them. I brought this up at a district meeting last year and was rebutted with questions regarding anonymity and family permissions, etc. and did not pursue the matter further at that time. I would love to have input from members regarding their thoughts on a Memory Book. Many other districts have these, to remember those that carried the message when we got here.

The work as an Archivist for District 55 can be simple or it can be challenging depending on the effort put into it. It is really more than just dragging out the historical material for viewing at Founder’s Day and Gratitude Dinner. At this years

Founder’s Day, talking with Sally C., I admitted that I was really a poor archivist. She replied, “whenever someone gets really good at one of these jobs, they probably aren’t qualified for it anymore.” Somehow, I take comfort in that thought.
